

# THE STORY

"When we started working on the Three Islands Project we needed to find a story that would work in all three locations. 'A Very Old Man with Enormous Wings' is a simple story that deals with profound issues of communities affected by change, and the metaphor of the sea bringing and taking away. This highlighted the commonalities between Malta, Cyprus and Cornwall and presented the possibility of adapting the story to the individual locations.

The intention was to represent a working community: a world that is self-sustaining and to explore how an unexpected arrival changes that. 'A Very Old Man with Enormous Wings' is a magical text, where different rules prevail.

One of the great things about theatre is that it can produce temporary communities.

The Three Islands Project has become one such community. I think what makes it different from other projects is the fact that it is truly international and that it travels. It somehow sets us all in a space where differences are valued and celebrated. We all start as strangers and nothing is taken for granted.

Not even a common language is taken for granted. The language of the show, spoken by a multicultural and multilingual cast, has become the language of our village 'Mahal-le' and it bears traces of Latin, Maltese, English, Spanish, Italian, Greek Cypriot and Japanese all gathered as we travelled and we also collaborated to invent words. The script has become a palimpsest: like an old medieval manuscript that has been erased and written over time after time, so open your eyes and listen with your heart."

## THE SHOW

"This production of 'A Very Old Man with Enormous Wings' is unique in a number of different ways. So how did this international project come about, how is it made and why have we chosen to perform it in Hayle Harbour?"

3 Islands Project - Malta and Cyprus

Kneehigh were invited to make a piece of work in Malta in 2000. The project was based on the memories of the local population in the face of rapidly evolving change in the town. The final show worked so well that we were invited back.

Two years later the British Council in Malta and Cyprus helped us to forge links with St James Cavalier in Valletta and THOC, the State Theatre of Cyprus in Nicosia; they in turn found performers, makers, musicians and the resources to create this epic 3-year 'Three Island Project

At each site the professional core team begins the making process. Every place makes its own special demands. In Malta we were near water, we needed to find boats and people to work them. We were introduced to local people willing to help us and they become part of the production. The team grew and every such chance encounter added meaning to the performance.

The production opened in Birgu, Malta, in September 2003, with a panoramic view across the Grand Harbour to Valletta. The whole town turned out to watch the event, witnessing local people abseiling down the 60ft sheer walls of the town, speed boats racing across the water and an 'angel' flying 300ft over the grand harbour.

In Cyprus in 2004 we had to get permission from the UN to build our village, as we wanted to place it on the Green Line, the buffer zone between the two separated halves of the island. THOC found us a rare and wonderful mix of Turkish and Greek Cypriot theatre makers and amazingly we also managed to get permission to allow the two halves to come together in the audience, although the Turkish Cypriot artists and audience had to come through passport control first. Our village was set in a derelict taverna, uninhabited since clashes made it unsafe to visit because of sniper fire. Every night we brought it back to life with songs, dances and poignant emotion.

Some memorable moments..

A Cypriot scout group building a rope bridge and a huge tree house for the set; a Greek police band accompanying the show; a local child with an amazing voice singing a plaintive farewell song. In Cyprus we discovered that Michalis Terlikkas, who plays Hermes in the show, is a major singing celebrity there, as he made his entrance on a tiny tricycle the packed audience surged forward cheering wildly and calling his name.

But my strongest memory making this show was in a rehearsal. Derman, a Turkish Cypriot performer began teaching his dance to the company. The Greek Cypriot girls immediately Joined him, with tears in their eyes they said, "we know this, and this is our dance as well". I had been told that the two cultures have been separated for 30 years. I now had a glimpse of what that meant and this is perhaps what this work does best—it leaps across boundaries of nationality, culture, language, prejudice and history.

This year it's time to bring the project home to the third island, Cornwall.

Hayle, Cornwall 200

This time we have built our village on South Quay in Hayle. The team not only perform in the village but also live in it.

We chose Hayle. This town, in common with Birgu and Nicosia, is now undergoin

a transformation. The harbour site we are on has been in limbo for many years, but for these few evenings our village will come to life. I don't know what surprises, lucky accidents, and wonderful chance encounter will happen here but they will, and they will become part of the meaning of the piece and produce many more memories.

encounters and the serendipity of working in unconventional spaces; I love meeting people and seeing them adding their particular skills to the project; I love watching the distinction between the audience and the performers gradually blur and I love seeing the project gathering layers of meaning day by day."



Preparation for the carnival interval started six months ago in Hayle. With the support of Creative Partnerships and the Local Heritage Initiative professional artists, musicians and theatre workers have been running the outreach programme with schools and youth groups in the area.

In engaging with the schools in an area, you reach far more than just the children. Just stand at the school gate at home time - parents, grandparents, aunties, uncles, older brothers and sisters, cousins, friends, Uncle Tom Cobley and all. The cook, caretaker and secretary are usually the fount of all knowledge. If you want to know who's who and what's what, ask them.

In Bodriggy we held a Tea-Treat. The children invited grandparents, dignitaries, historians and people with stories to tell and memories to share. In this wonderful afternoon the children and guests found out things you

might never find in a history book. They saw photographs that had been hidden in people's albums and came alive in the classroom. Some guests had been at the school 60 years ago.

Young and old looked at each other and Hayle anew. A living history of how things were and what they could be. True Heritage.

In Penpol we journeyed to the Harbour, remembering what was there and finding poetry in what is there now. The children have invented wonderful "Cures" from things they found in their town, reminding us of what a special place it is. Try them for yourselves and be proud of the young people of Hayle.

In these wonderful projects we have delved into local history, literacy, memory, the making of extraordinary artefacts, poetry, community and, uniquely, the results of this work will be part of the performance. On themes of flight, freedom, reminiscence, past and present, they have created small wonders, illusions and stunts that form an integral part of the interval experience.

We have been making theatre on their doorsteps, for and with the people of Hayle, and they have made us very welcome.
