

### Red River

The Red River was originally known as Dour Conor until the advent of the tin mining industry. Mining activity in the Tuckingmill Valley at Dolcoath, Cooks Kitchen and South Crofty mines meant that mineral waste was dumped in the river which turned the river red. Since the Cornish mining industry has all but ceased, with the exception of South Crofty, the river now only occasionally flows red.

### **Ghost Nets**

Modern plastic monofilament nets are non-biodegradable. When they break at sea they are cast overboard where they float in the ocean and continue to catch fish. As the weight increases the nets sink to the bottom with their haul of dead fish. As the catch rots, so the nets are released from the sea bed and and the cycle of ghostly trawling begins again.

#### **Pilchards**

Pilchard fishing was a major source of income in the 19th century in Cornwall with vast shoals arriving to turn the sea black. The arrival of the shoals in St Ives Bay would be hailed with cries of "Hevva, Hevva!". The last major catch was recorded in 1907 at St Ives when in that year 24 million pilchards were landed. After that the shoals dwindled and by 1924 the seiners (special inshore fishing boats used for pilchard fishing) were being broken up for firewood.
