Readen

At the request the director, I, Miguel de Cervantes Saavedra, hidalgo creator of the characters here portrayed, shall disclose few details of my life which was not without incider and adventure. Born of my mother in 1547 in Alcalá de Henares in Castille, not a great distance from the windmills of La Mancha, my family was large, usually impoverished and itinerant. My father, a surgeon moved us across Spain in search of work and wealth, as one point working for the Inquisition in Seville. As a young man, because of a duel, I was forced to leave Spain for Italy where I joined with our naval forces i an attack on the Turks at Lepanto. I fought like the ferocious Orlando, losing my left hand in bloody but victorious combat. Returning to Spain, our ship was captured by brigands and I was imprisoned in Algiers despite numerous attempts at escape, for 5 years while my family raised the ransom. Back in Spain I worked in the service of my country and king, the great and glorious Philip the Second. More trouble ensued as I was falsely accused of embezzling the taxes I was collecting and I was incarcerated in prison in Seville. There I nurtured the idea for my epic adventure story. Don Quixote de la Mancha, Part One, was first published in 1605 and everybody liked it! So much so that the charlatan Avellaneda managed to publish his version of the second part before I did ... the anger rises in my veins as I remember it. My Second Part appeared in 1615 but I did not long survive it as I died in April 1616. I always loved the theatre and especially outdoor productions - now you've seen this go and read

"As lightly as a supple Spaniard will throw a javelin Orlando picked up the table bodily and heaved it into the thick of the rabble. One had his chest stove in; another his belly or his skull; others had fractured legs or arms; some were slain outright, others maimed; those with least injuries tried to escape. It was like when a heavy stone falls on a knot of serpents sunning themselves in the late spring ... 

### Biographies

Sue Hill was born and raised in Cornwall. She trained at Rose Bruford College. Over the last 20 years she has worked as a performer, designer & maker with diverse companies: Welfare State International, Theatre Centre, Young Vic, The Kosh, Wren Trust, Walk the Plank, Emergency Exit Arts & of course Kneehigh. Her work has taken her to USA, Canada, Portugal, China, Russia, Holland and Belgium. In 1988 she returned to settle in Cornwall.

Allan Drake played in various rhythm and blues bands before being invited by Mike Shepherd to join him and group of friends to make a visual theatre for Cornwall - that group became Kneehigh Theatre. As well as working as performer, musician and technician for Kneehigh for the past 15 years, he has also worked on production and stage management for Glastonbury Festival, WOMAD and Trestle Theatre Company.

Colin Seddon was born in Manchester. He's been a musician since the age of 14. Founder of Inner Sense and member of the band 1985-93, returning briefly to collaborate with Kneehigh in last Summer's The Story of Carmen-Ravenheart. He is a total Brazilian musicaddict, visiting Brazil twice and parading in the 350-strong bateria of a 3500 strong Rio Samba School during the 1994 Carnival. Resident in Cornwall since November 1994, he is now musical director of a 50 piece Plymouth Samba School, Jam Samba.

Natasha Buckley was trained in Creative Arts at Trent then lured to Plymouth by the Barbican Centre. Since then she has worked on various projects including Footsbarn in Tavistock, Riverside Arts, Campus '93-95, the creation of The Wharf, as well as performing with Girls Own Theatre and touring extensively throughout the South West and beyond.

Stu Barker first worked with Kneehigh on Rammy a musical project which toured village halls in Cornwall in 1993. He has worked extensively with Horse and Bamboo as musical director, composer and musician and also Contact Theatre in Manchester. Experienced in street theatre and accomplished in a huge variety of instruments from Uilleann, Galithian and Northumbrian pipes to the zither and ukelele.

Jules Evans has worked as an actor in repertory theatre at Chichester and Manchester Royal Exchange and for the BBC, TSW and Westcountry since coming to the South West. He studied music at Dartington College of Arts and as a composer he has written for the BBC, Plymouth Theatre Royal and local radio and most recently the score for a dance piece, La Lutte, performed by DNA. He teaches music at The Hub Theatre School. Simon Edwards started performing professionally in 1979 at festivals and events in the South West. He trained at the Jacques Lecog International Theatre School in Paris and has acted, taught and directed throughout Europe and the USA. He first worked with Kneehigh in Wild Walks! last Summer.

Kyla Goodey started her theatrical career with the Cornwall Youth Dance Company and then on to the Hub Theatre School. Since completing the course last year she has performed and taught with DNA Dance Company. She has recently been accepted into the Arden Theatre School and Rose Bruford, she plans to continue working with Kneehigh in the future.

Paul Farmer took a degree in theatre at Dartington College of Arts after a highly successful career as a bus driver. He has written and co-written umpteen (at least) touring shows for Cornwall's A39 Theatre Group and performed with A39, Miracle Theatre, Bona Fide and Lumière & Son.

Bill Mitchell started working in theatre 20 years ago. He has directed and designed with many companies including Birmingham Rep. The Young Vic and more recently with Nottingham Playhouse. He has been associated with Kneehigh Theatre since designing Tregeagle seven years ago.



### **Future Projects**

Wild Works! A theatrical exploration of Cornwall's industrial heritage which places the audience in direct contact with performance, sculpture and landscape. They take place in three extraordinary post-industrial locations: a cliff top granite quarry, a valley full of gunpowder mills and seven acres of arsenic mining spoil. Kneehigh with sculptor David Kemp will unleash the conflicts and dramas of the past, relate them to the present and inject a futuristic perception a pastoral paradise or cauldron of conflict? 

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
